Snuggle Up and Read!

The Book Fair is here! The following are some tips to help encourage children to fall in love with reading.

Tips for reading to Infants through Preschool

- Snuggle, snuggle snuggle! Reading books together is a special time to bond and enjoy each other.
- Read with expression using different voices for different characters.
- Emphasize rhythms and rhymes in stories. Give your preschooler opportunities to repeat rhyming phrases. I often pause right before the next rhyming word in the story and have kids "read" it to me.
- Use pictures to develop vocabulary by talking about what is shown.
- Encourage your child to ask questions. Provide models of interesting questions and examples of possible answers. "I wonder what is going to happen next? I bet David is going to get in trouble because he broke the vase. What do you think?"
- Look for books that are about things that interest your young child. For example, does your child like cars, insects, or animals?
- Make reading a habit before bedtime, after lunch...
- Give your child a chance to choose his own books for reading. If your child chooses a book that is too long to hold his attention, read some and skip some, discussing the pictures and how they relate to the story.
- Read stories again and again. Children enjoy repetition and it helps them become familiar with the way stories are organized.

Tips for reading to and with children in K through 3rd grade

- Snuggle, snuggle snuggle! Keep reading aloud to your child even when he can read.
- Try reading books with chapters and talk about what is happening in the story. Encourage your child to make predictions about what will happen next and connect characters or events to those in other books and stories.
- Be a good role model and read for enjoyment— books, newspapers, magazines and then share your reading experiences with others. My children know that I love going to my monthly book club meetings and even ask what we talk about!
- Talk with your child about favorite authors and help him find additional books by those authors.
- Take turns reading a story with your child. Don't interrupt to correct mistakes that do not change the meaning.
- Enjoy yourself and have fun when you're reading together. The most important thing you can do to help your child become a successful reader is to let him know that you enjoy and value reading.
- Talk with your child about stories using the notions of the beginning, middle, and end of the story to organize thinking and discussion.

Tips for reading to and with children in grades four through six

- Snuggle, snuggle, snuggle! Take turns reading a book with your child. I remember reading the Harry Potter books aloud to my boys when they were in middle school. They were old enough to read it on their own, but what a nice memory we all have of that time as we went through the adventures of the series together.
- Ask your child to compare a book to another familiar book. How are the characters alike or different? Do the stories take place in similar settings? How are the illustrations the same or different?
- Ask if your child liked the ending of the story. Why or why not?
- Talk about the mood the story or chapter in a book creates. Ask how the author created that mood. Was it with words? Pictures? Drawings?
- If your child has read more than one book by the same author, ask how the books are similar or different.

Whatever you do, make it fun and enjoyable. A perfect place to start is by bringing your child to next weeks book fair and finding special pieces of literature together – then take those books home and snuggle, snuggle, snuggle!
